# Letter from the Vicar

Dear All

The sex lives of the animal kingdom have been the theme of another of David Attenborough's extraordinary series, 'The Mating Game'. Probably the most extraordinary episode is the one entitled 'Oceans out of the blue' which revealed the beauty and intimacy of life beneath the surface of our seas.



Approximately seventy-one percent of the earth's surface is covered by water and we think, therefore, that seventy-one percent of the earth's surface is inhabited by marine life. That is simply not accurate. Life on the surface of the earth, with the exception of birds and insects, is largely in one dimension, while the deepest part of the ocean is approximately 11,000 metres (36,000 feet). It brings it into perspective when you realise that Mount Everest extends only 9,000 metres above sea level. Marine life inhabits the sea layer upon layer and not simply on one level

I love the sea, and I love mountains. This is because I was raised on the Wirral Peninsular, surrounded on three sides by water, the river Dee, the river Mersey and the Irish Sea. As children we spent a significant amount of time dipping our toes in the water around the nine or ten sandy beaches that surrounded us. With our sandcastles and tides, with our sunsets and storms, we were always conscious of the power and beauty of our world but were oblivious to the sheer depth of beauty in the waters.

I get little chance these days to smell the sea, to feel the sand under my feet and listen to the rattling of the pebbles and it is so difficult to envisage from the land-locked urban sprawl of Bedford.

I am conscious as well of our un-affirming culture that requires every breathing hour from our souls. Think of a mother who is struggling to raise her two young children but having to work every given hour to make ends meet. Look at her eyes and see the shadows, how self-respect, self-worth and dignity have been taken from her. When my wife was teaching music in secondary schools she talked about how the demands of the job (and motherhood) gave her no opportunity any more for creativity. Others thrive on emails, communication and business activities, surrounding themselves with gadgets and technology without which it seems impossible to function. Even in ministry there seems less and less emphasis on stillness, time for thought, study and prayer but more and more unrealistic expectations in productivity.

There is a place, as beautiful as the oceans, filled with colour, life and meaning. There is a heavenly parent there who is always there for us. Blinded by our stuff, our struggle and our activity, this place, this God, is so difficult to see. It is good during these coming months to stop, to move closer to him, to perhaps dip our toes in the water, then, perhaps, if we are strong enough, to wade deeper and bury ourselves in the deep ocean of his love. Like the sea, in order to fully grasp its depth and its meaning, in faith we need to give our whole selves to Christ. Then we will look out and experience a different, beautiful and creative life in him

**Poppies for Remembrance Day**In October, 2021, the Queen attended a service in Westminster Abbey to mark the Centenary of the Royal British Legion. Since its foundation, the Legion has worked hard to support service men and women, veterans and their families. One of the main sources of fund raising to do this

has been the Poppy Appeal.

Last year, because of the Covid pandemic, for the first time in the history of the Poppy Appeal, the Legion's volunteers were unable to carry out face-to-face collections in England and Wales. Biddenham has a strong tradition of support for the Poppy Appeal. Many will remember Mrs Joy Bean who lived in Day's Lane for 57 years until she died in December 2011. In 2008, Joy was presented with a unique medal in recognition of 75 years' fund-raising work for the Legion. In an interview with the 'Bedfordshire Times and Citizen' Joy said:

'I started collecting for the Poppy Appeal with my mother when I was about 16 years old. I've always lived and collected around Bedford and Biddenham. I'm still a great supporter of the Poppy Appeal and the work the Royal British Legion does..... What would we have done without the men who fought in the wars? ..... I had three family members who fought in the War and lost my

brother.'


In 2010 Joy received special recognition at an 'evening of appreciation' hosted by the Royal British Legion at the Addison Centre, Kempston. As Joy had now sold poppies for even longer than when she got her first award, the Lord Lieutenant for Bedfordshire, Sir Samuel Whitbread, presented her with a special letter from the Queen which paid tribute to her commitment to and support for the Poppy Appeal. The Lord Lieutenant explained he had met Joy on numerous occasions and 20 years ago he had presented her with the British Empire Medal. Joy wore her Royal British Legion medal with great pride at this latest

Despite the issues raised by the Covid pandemic, we have still been able to support the work of the Royal British Legion. As Jacqui Piper pointed out in the October edition of 'The Loop', the Legion has a website and has promoted a range of poppy themed kits and digital patterns which can be bought from Deramores with a percentage of every sale donated to the Legion. This has enabled people to make their own poppy brooches. The Legion also welcomes donations and you can arrange for a personal tribute to be planted in one of the Legion's six Fields of Remembrance across the country. I always arrange for a tribute to be planted in the Welsh Field of Remembrance in Cardiff to remember my uncle who served in the Second World War. The Legion managed to plant the tributes last year despite the pandemic, though the ceremony had to be closed.

This year we hope that the November Remembrance Service at the Biddenham War Memorial will be as normal and that there will be a beautiful display of crocheted and knitted poppies organized by Jacqui Piper, like the display of flowers for Mothering Sunday. We will be able to gather once again to remember those who served their village and

their country.

# Biddenham Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 19th October 2021 at the Pavilion. Present at the meeting were Parish Councillors Graham Bates, Peter Chase, Chris Gee and Francia Slade. Apologies were received from Stewart Briggs, Krzys Osuch,



from Stewart Briggs, Krzys Osuch, Harry Fowler and Councillor Rigby. The Clerk, David Brough, and our Borough Councillor, Jon Gambold were also present. I'd like to thank Peter Chase for stepping in to chair the meeting at short notice.

# Parish Council Meeting

Attendance continues to improve with two members of the public present to hear the various discussions.

The first item of business was to elect two new members for the Parish Council. There had been three submissions to fill the two vacant roles but at the meeting one of the nominees stood aside. I am pleased to report that Karen Cotton and Irina Madan-Sau were elected and took their positions with immediate effect. We look forward to having them 'on-board'.

Among the various items of business for consideration this month was notification from the Church Warden at St James's advising the Parish that it wished to discontinue burials in the old churchyard at St James's; the new churchyard will continue to be available. In line with the legislation the responsibility for maintenance of the now 'closed churchyard' will pass to the Borough Council; they already manage many closed churchyards in the Borough such as St Cuthbert's Churchyard and Fosterhill Road Cemetery.

In my last report I reported that the Parish Council had agreed to spend £6,000 in support of the Trees for Streets scheme. Following site visits by myself and the Clerk we reached the conclusion that to make an impact we would need to plant more trees than our initial estimate of twenty. It was very encouraging to see Councillors agree to fund a further twenty trees, making 40 in total. The proposed areas for the new trees will be consulted on and can be viewed on the Parish Council website.

It was also great to see Councillors approve the grant request to Bedfordshire Police Partnership Trust for £500 to support the 'Bobby Van' who provide 'ring doorbells' for the above 65s. The Trust has promised that the funding will be exclusively used for residents in Biddenham Parish and that the units provided will not have monthly/yearly subscriptions and will work solely on a sim card.

The meeting also reviewed the arrangements for

The meeting also reviewed the arrangements for Remembrance Sunday which this year will be Sunday 14th November with the service commencing at 10.50am. I do hope that many of you will be able to attend this important event.

Finally, it was great to learn the Pavilion is now fully booked at weekends until the end of the year with booking requests starting to come in for 2022. Activities are also filling up during the week with only a few gaps left to fill.

# This month in the garden As the pace of jobs that have to be done slackens this is a

good time to do some work on longer term projects. I have, at last, done a job that I have been thinking about for several years. When we moved here many years ago, we had a wilder area along the back of the T-shaped land at the bottom of the garden. Over recent years I have worked on this to change it to more of a spring garden and I now have a line of camellias flanked by hellebores and snowdrops with an area of long grass growing daffodils, bluebells and a patch of snakes-head fritillaries in front. At one end of this there is an L-shaped border which is still pretty unkempt. I had a go at tidying this up last year but this month I have had a good clear out and put in some new perennials and now it looks like a garden and a fitting place to host my statuette of April; a young girl sitting crosslegged and radiating calm.

I mentioned this last month but, if you grow vegetables, you may well have harvested most of the produce and there will be empty spaces calling for attention. This is the traditional time for winter digging (not double digging nowadays) but a 'no digging' regime is becoming increasingly popular and this means hoeing the empty spaces to loosen the top soil and remove the weeds. If you still have root vegetables like parsnips or carrots in the ground they should be lifted and stored in dry soil or compost in a frost -free place. Many varieties of brassica (Cabbage family) and leeks will be ready for use now and in the coming winter months. Brassicas may need protection from marauding pigeons. You can sow broad beans for an early crop next year and you can try salad leaves in a heated greenhouse or on a windowsill indoors



for cut-and-come-again use.

Most spring bulbs should have been planted by now but November is the best time for planting tulips either in the ground or in containers. You may still be able to buy bedding plants for winter and spring colour with pansies (viola) the most popular.

Most plants can be bought in containers for planting at any time of the year but a good way, and the cheapest, is to buy bare-root plants now. The most likely to be available will be trees, roses and fruit bushes and canes. Prepare planting places with the addition of compost and don't plant when the ground is water-logged or in freezing and divisors. If provided the provided when conditions. If mail-order plants are delivered when conditions are not good unpack them and heel them in in a patch of loose soil. Soak the roots of freshly delivered plants for an hour or so before planting out. Trees will probably need to be staked to keep them growing upright. Summer-fruiting raspberries should be planted in a row with a stake at either end connected with two or three strands of strong wire. All newly planted plants will benefit from a good layer of mulch (kept away from the base of trunks or stems) and they should be well-watered. Keep plants ragularly watered throughout the first year. During plants regularly watered throughout the first year. During the last year or so we have had three trees planted by the Council on the verges opposite our house. The Council do come round and water them occasionally but not often enough. We kept the one nearest to us well watered and it is flourishing, but, of the two on the other side of the road which were not watered additionally, one is dead and the other not looking too healthy. If you have a newly-planted tree on the verge near you keep this in mind.


When the weather is wet or too cold for comfort remember that this is a good time for tidying up in a shed or greenhouse. Plants will grow better in a greenhouse with clean glass and hygienic conditions and it is quicker to find things in a tidy shed. This is adviced I need to had reveals things in a tidy shed. This is advice I need to heed myself. While thinking about glass don't ignore the advantages of having a cold frame which you can either buy or make fairly easily for yourself. A frame can provide winter protection for newly grown plants and is useful as a staging post for new plants that need hardening off before going to permanent positions. Alpines are plants that need to be kept out of the rain in winter to prevent rotting but, given good ventilation, don't mind the cold.

# **What's with Watts?**

Isaac Watts died on 25th November 1748. His tomb in Bunhill Fields, a former nondenominational burial ground particularly favoured by nonconformists, now in the London Borough of Islington, is in good company with John Bunyan, Daniel Defoe, William Blake and Susanna Wesley, the mother of Charles and John.

Isaac was small in stature, at five feet tall, but substantial in his achievements. Most particularly, he is regarded as the creator of the English hymn, and we still sing his hymns today, bringing Joy to the World. Before him it was psalm singing not hymns that formed the main musical component of church services in the English-speaking world. Isaac was at once a churchman, an educator, and an important minor poet influencing later poets including William Blake and Emily Dickinson.

The oldest of nine children, Isaac was born in Southampton

to Dissenter parents. His father was in prison when he was born and it is said his mother nursed him whilst sitting outside the prison gate on a silent protest against the unjust treatment of her husband. Isaac suffered poor health and frequent illness throughout his life. But despite that he showed remarkable ability as a child for languages, learning Latin when aged four, and for poetry.

Aged 16, Isaac had impressed a local doctor sufficiently for him to offer to support Isaac to attend Oxford University. But the university was affiliated with the established Church of England and to attend Isaac would have had to have converted, to conform. Instead, he attended the Newington Green Academy, a Dissenting institution in the area of London around Newington Green and villages including Stoke Newington and Hackney which had become the home of English Dissenters during the 17th century.

His studies prepared him to become a minister but he didn't feel ready yet for that office and, aged 20, he returned home, continuing to read, write and reflect. And, it is said, to write his first hymn *Behold the Glories of the Lamb*, having complained about the dull psalm singing at the family's church and encouraged by his father to try and change that.

Isaac moved back to London to work as private tutor to the nonconformist Hartopp family at their home, Fleetwood House, Church Street in Stoke Newington, where Isaac's convictions deepened. It was, he was quoted in a 19th century biography, '... five years of pleasure and improvement'. Watts was to become a prominent educator whose textbooks and educational theory were republished in Britain and America for more than a century, including his basic text on English usage *The Art of Reading and Writing English*.

When he was 24 he gave his first sermon and became assistant pastor at the Mark Lane Meeting, a large independent chapel, where he helped train preachers, becoming pastor in 1702. The congregation grew and Isaac's sermons began to be collected and printed. His success was due in part to his emphasis on the place of music in worship.

He published a volume of poetry in 1706 and a year later his three volume *Hymns and Spiritual Songs*. The latter, reissued in 1709 in an enlarged edition, is regarded as one of the most influential publications in the history of Protestantism. Isaac didn't write music; psalms and hymns at the time were sung to tunes known to congregations and/or choirs, but he did create a musical revolution with his

hymns written in a new language of personal worship that anyone could understand.

The original American edition of *Hymns and Spiritual Songs* was issued by Benjamin Franklin in 1741 and Isaac's texts were as widely disseminated in America as in England. It is thought they had a particularly strong impact in the religious life of African-American slaves and it is suggested the word 'spiritual' to describe a religious song is derived from the title of Watts' book.

The Hartopps' immediate neighbours in Stoke Newington were the nonconformist Sir Thomas and Lady Mary Abney, who lived at Abney House, Church Street. Sir Thomas, a merchant, a banker and one time Lord Mayor of London, became Isaac's patron, and Isaac moved in 1712 to live with the family. A post in August 2014 in the blog, *On Women and Gender*, tells us of Lady Abney's sermon notebook and more of her and Isaac.

Her notebook records her attendance at church and the sermons she heard in the years 1722 - 1723, including the name of the preacher, the date preached, and a key line of scripture from the sermon. Sometimes she would listen to two sermons in one day. It seems some 46 sermons are summarised of which 17 are by Isaac Watts. Many of the sermons are annotated in another hand, which may have been Isaac's, and on the front page of the notebook there is an inscription 'To Mrs. Mary Abney/Novr: 27th. A.D. 1722.' Under which appear the initials 'I:W'.

The post continues that according to Isabel Rivers' entry on Isaac in the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography, after Sir Thomas' death in 1722 when the family moved permanently to Abney House from Sir Thomas' property in Hertfordshire, Isaac continued to live with Lady Abney and her two daughters: 'They represented the ideal dissenting household. Watts thanked Lady Abney in the dedication to Divine Songs (1715): It is to her unwearied Tenderness, and many kind Offices by Night and Day, in the more violent Seasons of my Indisposition, that (under God) I own my Life and Power to write or think.'

He lived with the family for 36 years until his death in 1748. He had particularly enjoyed the grounds at Abney Park, laid out by Lady Mary and accessed from both Fleetwood House and Abney House, a source of inspiration for his books and hymns.

There is a memorial to Isaac in Westminster Abbey, and statues in Abney Park Cemetery, Stoke Newington, and Watts Park, Southampton: but he lives on through his hymns.





# Artists and their gardens

On Tuesday 19th October we were so pleased to be joined by Dr Twigs Way. Dr Way is a researcher, writer and consultant in garden history and designed landscapes. She is well known to members of the BGA as, amongst other things, she lectures at Rothsay Education Centre, gives talks to The Arts Society and has also visited us in Biddenham on numerous occasions. Twigs started the session by saying that she would be talking about artists of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries and that although many of the gardens depicted were from the heartland of France she would also be referring to gardens in England and Germany. Twigs' presentation was wide ranging - here is a small snap-shot of her talk.

Twigs took as her theme well known artists who were also horticulturalists and gardeners. They were drawn together by their love of art and gardening and influenced each other in both. Many of these artists were used to painting 'en plain air' and so capturing the images of their own gardens was a natural progression. Gardening is an art in itself - it is an art form and painting gardens, plants and landscapes becomes a reciprocal, reflective relationship. Many of the artists knew each other and regularly visited each other's gardens and indeed some, as in Broadway in the Cotswolds, Charleston in Sussex and Benton End in Suffolk lived together. During Twigs' talk and looking at the stunning paintings we caught glimpses of the life these artists lived with their wives, mistresses and children.

There were many similarities in the artists' work in capturing the outside space. They portrayed their gardens

and often the same view of the garden over and over again at different times of the year and different times of the day, using the light so that each painting took on a different aspect reflecting contrasting tones and hues. Twigs drew our attention to the splashes of colour and daubs of paint depicting bright pink and red of pelargoniums, nasturtiums and chrysanthemums. These colours were often picked out in the colour of the dresses worn by the women and children portrayed. I particularly liked Frederick Frieseke's painting of the women in white dresses in the garden at Giverny reflecting the white of the tall lilium regale in the background. Many of the paintings depicted looking into the garden - this was true of Monet and Caillebotte. The artists often planted their gardens in blocks of colour, as in a paintbox and this was reflected in the blocks of colour used in their artistic impressions. The artists also took flowers, for example chrysanthemums, from their gardens to paint still life pictures. In contrast Pierre Bonnard, who knew Monet well and visited Giverny frequently, had a small garden and portrayed this in a different way - looking out from his 'Garden of Eden' as he called it to the landscape beyond. It was a jardin sauvage -

wild and overgrown but it also let in the light.

Monet, in particular, was obsessed with his garden at Giverny, he put his whole life into creating it, telling visitors when to come to catch the various flowers at their best. His garden became his legacy for his friends. Like many of the other artists he created a formal garden but transformed this, in his paintings, into something more impressionistic, less formal and unstructured. The gardens provided the inspiration, but as some of the photographs of these gardens revealed, they were perhaps not factually portrayed. However, the gardens these artist/gardeners captured on canvas brought to life the personal paradise they had created. Monet said 'My garden is slow work pursued by love' and 'All the money I carned went into my condon.' I think many of the carned went into my garden'. I think many of us can relate to those sentiments. How lucky we are that he and the other artists had the talent and inspiration to provide such a wonderful legacy for us to enjoy.

Many thanks to Twigs for such an informative and enjoyable talk and for reminding us that, as well as visiting gardens, there is such joy to be had from art galleries and exhibitions.
