Church bell ringing Regular bell ringing at St James's stopped around five years


Regular bell ringing at St James's stopped around five years ago, mainly due to the retirement of some of the band and a lack of new ringers taking their places.

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Letter from the Vicar

Dear All

As I am writing this, we have just had a memorial service for the anniversary of the start of the war in Ukraine. This has been the focus of a lot of my attention over the last twelve months and I have found myself deeply connected with the narrative of those who have been displaced by this terrible war. Carried with this is also a



deep sense of responsibility for those we have tried to serve in the Ukrainian community. The Ukrainian people have been extremely gracious and respectful to us and as they have been absorbed so deeply into our community, I was reminded the other day of how we must continue to be gracious in our responsibility to serve them. One friend the other day, herself from Ukraine, reminded me of a quote by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, in his extraordinary book The Little Prince: "You become responsible forever for that which you have tamed."

Responsibility lies at the heart of my reflection this year on Lent. I was reminded of the responsibility given to Abraham that he would be used for the purpose of blessing all the families of the earth. It would seem, however that actually the people of Israel became more introspective.

God set Israel free from slavery in Egypt and they consequently established, according to the narrative, a 40 year nomadic existence in the Wilderness. Eventually they ended their journey by passing through the river Jordan into the promised land. At the heart of this promised land the Temple was constructed in Jerusalem and that became the tabernacle (house) of God.

In the New Testament, we read the stories of John the Baptist and the Baptism of Jesus. John did not invent Baptism. If anybody wanted to become a Jew, the Pharisees would have asked that gentiles mirrored that journey of Israel from the wilderness into the promised land. This they would do by passing through the Jordan. That was symbolic of God's liberation of his people. One could not become a Jew without this.

John's baptism of Jesus turns this on its head. Jesus, by going into the waters of the Jordan, does not move from the wilderness to the city of God, but rather Jesus emerges from the Jordan and sets off in the wrong direction into the wilderness. There, like with Israel's 40 years, Jesus spends 40 days in the place of chaos and shadows.

As we, disciples of Christ, follow Jesus, we too are called to be risk takers. We walk with Jesus into the wilderness of chaos and shadows. We go with Jesus to meet the lost, the broken, the rejected, the fallen. That is the mission of the church during Lent. It is not to give up chocolate or alcohol, but rather to give up the status of piety and self-righteousness and instead become scandalised by embracing the broken and untouchables. We agree to go out into the wilderness to bring the Gospel to the poor, heal the broken-hearted, bring sight to the blind and bring liberation to the captives (Luke 4:18).

We are called to take a different route to the religious expectations by risking the scandal of unacceptability and going out from our tabernacles into the wilderness to confront the power and temptation of the wilderness.

Biddenham conservation volunteers have been out again this month.

Tree planting has been our most recent activity in Cowslip Meadow while we wait for the season to move us forward into other activities. The trees were supplied by The Forest of Marston Vale so we thank them for supporting community planting on the fringe of their area. We have planted most of the trees in a gap to promote noise reduction from the bypass and others alongside the top hedge as amenity trees.

Before that our enthusiastic team constructed a 'dead hedge' over a number of sessions by the footpath near the church. The material was all sourced from cut coppice and the uprights were enthusiastically sharpened before being put in to stabilise the material. This kind of construction can provide a protective site for small animals to move about or provide a wind break for the nearby hedge.

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Biddenham **Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 21st February at the Pavilion. Present at the meeting were Parish Councillors, Peter Chase, Karen Cotton, Chris Gee, Harry Fowler and Krzys Osuch. Apologies were received from Irina Madan-Sau and



Francia Slade. Also present were the Clerk, David Brough, myself and our Borough Councillors, Jon Gambold and

Roger Rigby.

I am pleased to report that at this meeting the Parish Council agreed to co-opt Aaron Melvin to the vacant Councillor position. Aaron lives on the St Mary's estate in the Parish and brings a range of skills to the Council. On behalf of us all we welcome him into his new role.

At the meeting the Clerk provided an update on various projects that mostly seem to sit with Borough Highways. One project 'in progress' is the provision of double yellow lines along part of Gold Lane. Apparently these are to be done concurrently with planned Duck End Lane restrictions. The Parish is just waiting for a date for the work. In the same area Borough Highways will install a column so that the new Speed Indication Device purchased by the Parish can be installed on it. Again, the Parish is waiting for a date for this work.

As the new development north of Bromham Road progresses the Parish Council have been asked for their view on the street naming for the development. The proposal put to us is to continue with the Scottish theme adopted for the estate off King George Avenue (which is in Queens Park Ward). This theme was in recognition of the 17,000 Scottish territorial soldiers who arrived in Bedford in mid-August 1914. After spending nine months in the

Interestingly, the Foster Hill Road cemetery has a memorial area remembering 33 Highland Division men who succumbed to a disease which affected the Division during the winter of 1914/15 while in the Borough. It is well worth a visit.

A request for grant funding was also approved. The $\pounds 621$ approved will enable the Biddenham Conservation Group to continue their sterling work helping to maintain important green spaces in and round the village. A further sum, up to £200, was approved to enable the group to buy plants to help thicken the hedge line between the Bromham Road service road and Bromham Road (in the vicinity of the new roundabout), filling in some of the obvious gaps.

The meeting also discussed the problem of parking near schools. Main Road came up again with reports that drivers were now using the green space adjacent to the pub car park to get onto Main Road avoiding parked vehicles. This is not only dangerous, but also shows a disregard for our local area. We will contact the landowner's Agent asking him to work with us to see how this can be prevented. Another problem is the parking of vehicles outside Biddenham school. We already have many bollards in place and while further bollards will deter the parking they won't improve how the street looks. We, therefore, agreed to explore whether some additional trees in new locations, together with the replacing of some existing bollards with new trees, would achieve the desired outcome while improving the look of the area.

In my last report I mentioned the Parish was developing a process to assess projects against which we could use the additional income to be received via the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). I am pleased that we have now agreed how projects will be assessed for the new funding and this will be posted on our website for all to see. Please do take a look.

Finally, I hope many of you will have noticed the new trees (purchased under the 'Trees for Streets' programme) have been planted in the last week or so; as has the memorial tree for our former Councillor, Graham Bates. I hope future generations will benefit from this work.



Dee Dite

Dee died on 28th December at the age of 82 and her funeral was held at St James's on 26th January. We are grateful to Dee's daughter, Louise, and son in law, John Olphin, for these reflections on her life.

Farewell to Mum

A bright light went out of all our lives when Dee passed away so suddenly. She was a real live wire and, despite her arthritis, was



It is a great comfort to my brother and I that she passed peacefully in her sleep, but the shock of losing her is hard to deal with. She was a wonderful mum and a kind and thoughtful friend.

Mum was always regaling us with tales of her life. She first met Dad when they were both working on the Bedfordshire section of the M1 in the early sixties. She described him as a very tall, blond and very tanned man who had just arrived back from a year in Africa building roads in the bush. When Dad first took Mum out for dinner he had to turn down the roof on his Austin Healy to accommodate mum's beehive. They married in 1961 and I came along four years later. Dad was a Civil Engineer working for John Laing and was very ambitious. He arrived home one day to tell mum he had been promoted, but it meant moving from Dunstable to Carlisle! Mum was slightly worried as I was only four months old and she didn't drive. We were one of the first houses to be occupied on the new John Laing housing development, but she took it all in her stride and was soon making friends with other young mums and setting up a play group and babysitting circle.

My brother, Alistair, arrived during our time in Carlisle and life changed dramatically. He was a little horror! One day, when mum was on the phone in the hall, my brother took everything out of the fridge, including a dozen eggs, and he and the dog were paddling round in the mess. Ali and our Beagle dog, Crofty, were in cahoots causing all sorts of trouble. Every picture we have of Ali as a toddler is of him holding his biscuit above his head being pursued by the dog!

Mum used to have two favourite phrases – 'wait 'til your father gets home and hears about this' and alternatively 'don't tell your father about this;' for example when she reversed the car round the drive wearing the 1970s essential fashion accessory of cork wedges – and unable to press the brake hard enough, bumped into the side of the house. Needless to say, as soon as Ali heard dad's key in the door, he ran up to tell him exactly what mum had done! However, later on in life, mum loved visiting Ali in London. She loved buzz and excitement and the unusual and unique places he took her to.

Mum had a great capacity for fun and, in the summer holidays, when our cousins, Gail and Shelley, came to stay, she would bundle us all into her little Ford Anglia and take us swimming or to the zoo. She even overlooked the mess when our cousins taught us how to make life-size papier-mache animals.

I know so many of you will miss Dee's friendship and for me the thing I will miss most is her love and her guiding hand.



I first met Dee in 2013 when I started to date her beautiful daughter, Louise, who since our marriage has enabled me to spend time getting to know and love Dee.

During this time, our families came together and with Dee's family being quite small, she really enjoyed it when she was introduced to the madness that is the Olphin family. I am pleased to say that she fitted right in! She loved seeing how her extended family were doing and regularly took part in birthday celebrations, BBQ's, music nights and family parties.

We had so much in common as we had both lived in Biddenham. She adored her life and friends in Biddenham and I could see how sad she must have been when she moved away.

From the stories Dee has told me, she certainly did live a full life herself. I could tell that she was madly in love with Bob, her husband of many, many years and missed him dearly. But even when he was taken from her, Dee picked herself up and lived a very active life.

I was thinking how I could let you know more about Dee in a short space of time, so I decided to highlight five words that show what an amazing woman Dee was from my perspective.

Generous. Dee was a generous woman.

Dee was always involved in helping out someone and, ever since I have known her, she was actively involved in the Bedford and Kempston Conservatives Association. She loved organising events, raffles, hog roasts, hosting a dinner for ministers and future prime ministers and those tricky quiz nights! Dee was a real giver of her time for anyone who needed help and, in my opinion, she lived the phrase 'giving is better than receiving'.

Family. At the heart of everything Dee did was family.

She absolutely adored Louise and Alistair and was always recounting stories of the time they spent growing up as Louise has just highlighted. When I joined her family she welcomed my children Adam, Olivia and Joshua with open arms and we have spent some real fun times together.

Fun. Dee always wanted to have fun.

She always had the capacity to introduce fun into a conversation. She would always have a smile and a glint in her eye. She always helped set up the mother-in-law jokes for me and we had many a laugh when she got caught out. Did you notice that she had started to walk on the lean as I had pulled her leg so much! I told her that the lean was called son-in-lawitis and she said she didn't know it was a real condition. Gotcha Dee!

She was a real fighter.

I regarded her as the bionic woman as she had two replacement knees, one replacement hip, had been through the windscreen of a car in an accident and more recently broke her arm during Covid. Dee really struggled with the broken arm, but her indomitable spirit got her through the pain and frustration and I remember taking her to see her consultant after she had been in a sling for 10 weeks with her saying: "I don't care what he says, I am walking out of the hospital without this sling!" And she did.

Dee was a Trekkie!

It may surprise you to find out that Dee was a real Star Wars and Star Trek fan. She loved sci-fi and many a time we would invite her over to watch the premiere of these movies. She absolutely loved them. Who would know?

One thing was very constant with Dee and that was how much she loved Louise and Alistair and how proud she was of both of you. I am sure she would want me to tell you: "Mourn me but also love, live and laugh." Just as she did.

Dee, till we meet again, "May the Force be with you."

Troubled times

As 1891 dawned, trouble lay ahead for the Biddenham station in Queensland named, as we've seen, after our village in Bedfordshire.

The growth of trade unions in Queensland increased during the 1880s as trade and labour councils played a greater role in mediating disputes between workers and employers.

However, the Depression of the 1890s, with falling wool and metal prices and loss of foreign investment, led to the breakdown of industrial relations and a series of major strikes.

Pastoralist employers imposed wage reductions of between 15% and 33% or 'freedom of contract', hiring non -union labour, or both on shearers in 1891 and the shearers went on strike, which brought trouble to the door of sheep stations, including Biddenham.

The shearers were clearly impressed by their their not employers.

Below the eye catching headline 'Disgraceful scenes at Oakwood and Biddenham' in the Brisbane Courier in April 1891 the paper printed Police Inspector J Stuart's report of 3rd April, sent from Augathella to Commissioner of Police in Brisbane.

Sheep runs in Biddenham and Oakwood stations were extensively fired and Inspector Stuart wrote of arrests of unionists made on (www.qhatlas.com.au/ 28th, 30th and 31st March.

Following the unionists on the road to Augathella 'All the

gates they passed through, except those immediately at Biddenham station, they had taken off their hinges, broken up, piled against the gate posts, and burned. They also cut and destroyed as much fencing as they could possibly get at conveniently, 'the Inspector wrote.

'When passing Biddenham station, in the hearing and presence of a number of respectable women who live in houses near the main road, some of the mob made use of the most revolting and disgusting language, and conduct; indeed their conduct was more that of fiends than men, continued the Inspector.


When we reached Biddenham station, in consequence of the heavy state of the country, the horses ridden by the Mounted Infantry were knocked up, but Mr Peddle, with his usual thoroughness, had fresh horses in the yard for them, and it was not long before we were again after them.

There were many other reports in newspapers: 'They appear to have vented their ill-feeling at the neighbouring station of Biddenham, but on arrival at Augathella, where it became necessary, in the face of 200 unionists, to read the Riot Act, fourteen were arrested for arson and conspiracy.' The Riot Act was read by Captain King accompanied by thirty police and Mounted Infantry men.

These and later events, including the 'brilliant ride of Captain King to Biddenham following unionists' and an attempt in May to burn a wool shed at the Biddenham station, were later the subject of a debate in July in the State Legislative Assembly.

Looking a bit further into the background and the shearers' strike itself, working conditions for shearers were not good. But as the wool industry grew, so did the number and influence of shearers.

By 1890 the Shearers' Union had tens of thousands of members and that year laid down a new rule which prohibited members from working with non-union workers. The Pastoralists formed their own Federal Council to

counter the strength of the union.

The tipping point came when, at Logan Downs station, the shearers were asked to sign a contract that would reduce the power of their union. On 5th January 1891 the shearers announced a strike until their demands were met:

maintaining existing rates of pay;

• protecting workers' rights and privileges;

• just and equitable agreements; and

• exclusion of low cost Chinese labour.

The strike quickly spread and resulted in large camps of striking workers. Queensland was on the brink of civil war and thousands of armed soldiers protected non-union labour and arrested strike leaders.

The strike, though, was poorly timed for maximum effect on the shearing season (winter). The summer was wet and when the union workers ran out of food, they were forced to come to terms.

Thirteen union leaders were charged with sedition and sentenced to three years in gaol. They were released in November 1893.

Banjo Paterson's song, Waltzing Matilda, an unofficial

Australian anthem, was written about the era of the shearers' industrial disputes in Queensland and New South Wales following perhaps the most violent strike, in 1894.

For us, Inspector Stuart in his report happily revealed another associated with Biddenham statioMr Peddle, who it transpired was the man to whom John Holdsworth Macfarlane sold the station in 1884.

Jumping forward to 1903, John George Andrews Peddle died in Rockhampton, Queensland, aged 57, after six years as Executive Officer of the Central and Northern Pastoral Employers' Association. A report of his death recorded that he was born in Somersetshire, England, and was around 20 years 'Freedom of age when he migrated to Dishonor': the thirteen Australia, where his life was union leaders released 'wholly given to the pastoral (Public domain) industry. First in New South Wales



mainly in the Riverina district, and then for the remainder in Queensland. His Queensland life was spent between Biddenham Station, in the Warrego district, which he held for many years and Rockhampton,

Mr Peddle had owned Biddenham station jointly with a Mr Frean, a newspaper report in 1884 revealed, and they 'seem determined to make the place a model homestead' unlike most of the other stations in the neighbourhood which 'have knocked off making improvements'. J W Frean and J G A Peddle had arrived in Brisbane in August 1883 having sailed from Sydney on the ASN Company's Egmont; and a few months later had bought some Tasmanian sheep in 'The first of what it is hoped will prove to be a series of annual sales of pure merino sheep ...'. Mr Frean otherwise remains a mystery.

As far as we can judge, the station moved from the ownership of Peddle and Frean into the hands of the New Zealand Loan and Mercantile Agency Company around 1897, remaining with that company until 1906, when the company sold it to Robert Darvall Barton of whom more next time, when we will also talk about Mary Poppins. Yes, that Mary Poppins!

New life for toaster through Bedford Repair Cafe

One of our favourite wedding presents was a chrome Dualit toaster. We loved its classic industrial design.

Over the years, it worked hard and travelled hard, but was showing distinct signs of age.

Whilst it was great for thin-sliced bread, anything thicker ended up wedged in its narrow slots. Years of trying to dislodge crumpets and teacakes with the handle of a wooden spoon had taken their toll on the elements.

Eventually, we replaced it with a new toaster which can toast anything, thick or thin, at twice the speed of the Dualit. And our faithful wedding present was consigned to a box, together with the new elements we had bought, but never got round to fitting.

So, when we found out about Bedford Repair Café on Facebook, we decided to see if there was still hope for it. This quarterly pop-up repair shop is held at different venues across Bedford and is run by local volunteers who can repair anything from household appliances to bikes, toys and clothes. Repairs are free of charge, but donations help towards venue hire. They also set up a pop-up café so you can enjoy refreshments while you wait.



We booked a slot at the January pop-up Repair Café at Queen's Park Academy. Volunteers, David and Bert, started by asking about the age of the toaster and what was wrong with it. Then they set to work dismantling it.


The great thing about Bedford Repair Café is they don't just fix things; they show you how to do the repairs yourself so that you will be confident of having a go should they break again in the future.

We had great fun as David and Bert showed us how to access the innards and identify which elements were broken. We removed the faulty ones and they showed us how to fit replacement parts. It was a fiddly job and thankfully the spare parts came with a handy 6.5mm spanner as none of David and Bert's spanners were small enough. We learnt how to clean and improve the connectors and when we had finished, they carried out a PAT test for us. After all these years, it was once again in full working order.

It now toasts perfectly - but we prefer our more efficient replacement model with its multi settings. So, our dear old Dualit will shortly begin a new life at our daughter's university flat.

Be wary of Nottingham Knockers

Recently a young salesman knocked on our door claiming to be an ex-criminal looking to turn his life around by taking part in a local rehabilitation scheme. He asked if we would like to buy goods he was selling from a large holdall.

It's the second time this has happened and several residents in Biddenham and Great Denham have also reported similar incidents.

These bogus salesmen are part of the so-called 'Nottingham Knockers' scam.

What are Nottingham Knockers?

Nottingham Knockers originated in Nottingham, hence the name, and sell over-priced, low quality goods door-todoor. They sometimes present a fake ID to show they are part of a rehabilitation programme. However, they are not part of any recognised scheme.

They are reportedly looking for burglary targets by finding out who lives in the house, particularly if the occupant is vulnerable, and whether they hold sums of cash at home as they only accept cash payments.

What to do if they call at your home?

- Be wary of buying anything from doorstep salesmen
- Never let them into your home
- If concerned, contact the police by calling 101

Both times they have called at our home we have politely but firmly said "no" and they have gone away without incident. We then alerted neighbours of their presence in the area through our street WhatsApp group.

This month in the garden Did you take part in the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch at the

For many years I have recorded the birds in the garden on the appointed day with children and grandchildren -quite often having little to report as the birds seem to know we are recording them and go elsewhere for the day. I wasn't going to take part this year, but on the Sunday morning I looked out of my office window and there on the front lawn were a flock (10 in all) of Redpolls pecking up the seeds that had fallen from the silver birch catkins. I had seen them a couple of weeks before hanging upside down on the branches of the birch taking the seeds. I was so pleased that they were back - birch seeds being their favourite food according to my RSPB bird book. I couldn't miss the opportunity to record them so I sat down with pencil and paper and noted the other birds - robins, blue tits, black birds, sparrows and of course, pigeons that stopped by during the hour. stopped by during the hour.

What joy these birds bring during the cold winter months and they need all the help they can get from us as, I understand from the RSPB website, that over the last 50 years we have lost more are new on the LIK Ped List for and even house sparrows are now on the UK Red List for and even house sparrows are now on the UK Red List for birds. The blue tits have been investigating the bird box in my front garden. For several years they took up residence, but not for the last couple of years. It is in a good position and within a short flying distance of the oak trees on King's Corner where they can harvest the caterpillars to feed their young - but they are quite picky so they may

seek nest boxes elsewhere.

I am writing this in the second week in February on a wonderful bright sunny morning and I guess, like me, you have been marvelling at the fabulous sunsets.

My garden is becoming a great delight with drifts of snowdrops behind the pond and under the silver birch trees. In the autumn I planted lots of new miniature iris, plus planting out the ones that I had grown in pots the previous spring - they never do well if left in the pots, but planted into the ground they get a new lease of life. Some daffodils are starting to show their colour and the tulips are peeping through. I wish I could grow aconites, but they don't like my garden. My daughter has thousands in her garden in Cambridge. They spread out from under the trees and onto the lawn. Each year, with her permission, I dig up loads but they do not do well with me.

said that I would report back on the amaryllis that I had saved from last year. I was very late potting them up but I am pleased to report that one has a fat flower bud. Yesterday afternoon I went out into the garden to inspect my pots and tubs and they were so dry. I spent the next hour watering them well. It was mild and frost free so an ideal opportunity. The narcissus in my cutting pots were all in bud so the water will help them along and soon I will be picking them for the house. Camelia and chaenomeles buds were showing their colours. There was so much to see in the garden and so uplifting - what a lovely time of the year with the promise of everything to come. Staying positive is something we all need to do in these globally challenging

So, gardening jobs for March. Seed sowing begins in earnest and it is a good idea to cover the soil with a cloche

or polythene for a week or so before sowing outside to help warm up the soil. But salad crops, vegetable and hardy annual flower seeds can be sown in a green house. Don't be too hasty as the middle of the month is fine when the light levels are better and the nights are less cold. Pinch out the tips of early sown sweet peas to encourage side shoots. Plant summer flowering bulbs such as lilies, gladioli, and crocosmia. This year I am growing ranunculus for the first time. I am going to start them off in pots in the plant house. Now is the time to start off dahlia tubers under cover in a shallow tray of moist compost. They will start to shoot in a few weeks and then you can take cuttings. Divide snowdrops that have finished flowering but are in full leaf. A good time also for planting new snowdrops in the green (when they are in leaf). Finish pruning roses and also prune the spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia, cutting back to strong young shoots. Pruning at this time gives the plant time to develop growth for next year's flowers. But most of all, keep providing fresh water and food for our feathered friends who, in turn, will continue to visit our gardens and forage for the creatures that destroy our crops later in the year, so it's a win-win.

Photo ID will be needed to vote in person at the May elections

From May 2023, voters will need to show an accepted form of photographic identification (photo ID) in order to receive their ballot paper(s) to cast their vote in a polling station at:

- UK Parliamentary general elections
- Recall petitions
- local elections in England
- local referendums in England
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections in England and Wales

This means that you will need photo ID for the local Mayor and council elections on Thursday 4th May.

Most people will already have an acceptable form of ID; a valid passport or a driving licence. You can find the full list of acceptable documents by going to the Bedford Borough Council website.

If you don't have a suitable document, or you don't want to use it, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate up to six days before polling day. You can apply online or on paper to Bedford Borough Council. Full details are given on their website.

These new rules do not apply to Postal Voters. If you are already registered you will receive your Postal Vote in the usual way.

Timeline for the May elections

Registration to vote deadline - 12 midnight on Monday 17th April

Postal vote application deadline - 5.00pm on Tuesday 18th April

Proxy vote application deadline - 5.00pm on Tuesday 25th April

Voter Authority Certificate application deadline - 5.00pm on Tuesday 25th April

Polling day - Thursday 4th May Count - Friday 5th May




More trees for Biddenham





Inspiring gardens

Many of us gain great enjoyment from visiting gardens large and small throughout the year. Paul Fricker, our Chair of BGA, is no exception and we were so pleased that he agreed to share with us some of his stunning photos of the most beautiful inspirational gardens

The first one was Aston Pottery Garden in the Cotswolds which brought back many happy memories as we went there on a BGA outing several years ago and were bowled over by the fabulous borders, the lovely pottery, excellent restaurant and the energy and enthusiasm of the owner - time for a return trip maybe.

The second garden was more local. Many of us have visited The Swiss Garden, created by Lord Ongley in the 1820s and designed in the then fashionable 'Swiss Picturesque' style. But who knew that this garden was floodlit before Christmas as part of the Christmas Illuminations? The photos were just WOW!

Paul then went back to 2018 when he and Kathy stayed with some American friends in Florida and they were able to explore several gardens with a subtropical feel. Many of the houses and gardens had been bought by very wealthy people who had travelled the world seeking out exotic plants. These gardens, including The Leu Gardens and the Bok Tower Garden, are now open to the public.

Paul's photos included the Wetlands with beautiful images of roseate spoonbill, great egret and tricoloured heron which drew gasps from the audience - they were so beautiful and needless to say there was also a photo of an

alligator - synonymous with this area.

Paul, who had spent six years living and working in Hong Kong, showed photos of the park in the heart of Hong Kong - a tranquil space contrasting completely with the surrounding high-rise buildings. The photos of the various orchids were just lovely.

Paul went on to showcase six different gardens in the west country.

He started off with Knightshayes near Tiverton. This is a National Trust Garden with beautiful mature trees. Lying within a medieval priory is Cannington Walled Garden, which is now owned by Bridgewater and Taunton College for students studying horticulture. The students maintain the garden which includes a potager garden with complementary planting to keep pests at bay. Greencombe house and garden are on the edge of Exmoor near to Porlock on the north Somerset coast. The azaleas and Phodedendrops were just fabulous and Paul had taken some rhododendrons were just fabulous and Paul had taken some wonderful photos of large patches of erythronium lilies which are part of the national collection.

Dunster Castle in north Somerset provided the opportunity for photos of stunning views of the Quantock Hills and Exmoor. The gardens of Hestercombe were laid out by Gertrude Jekyll and are very typical of her style. Paul and Kathy had visited the garden when it was floodlit as part of the Christmas illuminations. The final garden was RHS Rosemoor near Bideford. Beautiful rose gardens, cottage gardens, Mediterranean garden, exotic garden, wild flower meadows and a stumpery were all captured by Paul

What a wonderful journey through fascinating gardens. Thank you Paul - we appreciated the time and effort involved in producing a really lovely presentation - totally relaxing and inspirational and for those of you who were unable to be with us - well you missed a real treat!
